3. Explain how Protestantism in England developed according to who was on the throne.

Henry VIII	<p>Act of Supremacy declares the monarch as the head of the Church in England. Henry has Archbishop Thomas Cramer grant him an annulment so he can marry Anne Boylen.</p> <p>The theology of the Church of England will be Catholic.</p>
Edward VI	Influenced by Thomas Cramer the theology of the Church of England moves toward Calvinism.
Mary Tudor (Bloody Mary)	Returns the Church of England to a more Catholic theology. Queen still remains as head of the Church. Persecutes Calvinists.
Elizabeth I	Wants to end the religious tensions within the Kingdom and restore peace and order. Creates the Anglican Church as the government sponsored church. All most belong to this Church. She isn't too concerned about theology so the Anglican Church will vary from closely Catholic theology to very Calvinistic theology depending on the individual parish.

4. The Eucharistic Real Presence of Jesus

1. Define Substance. Substance is that which makes something what it is. It is it's soul or pyschce.
2. Define Form. Form is the material characteristics of an object. It's accidents.
3. Explain transubstantiation. Who believes in transubstantiation? Transubstantiation means that there is a change in the substance while the form remains the same. So for us as Catholics we believe that at the words of consecration spoken by the priest at Mass, the substance of the bread and wine turn into

the substance of the body and blood of Jesus. The form, the material characteristics remain that of bread and wine, but the reality of what it is, its substance, is the body and blood of Jesus.

4. Explain consubstantiation. Who believes in consubstantiation? Consubstantiation means with the substance. Lutherans believe that the substance of Jesus' body and blood are present with the substance of the bread and wine. The bread and wine remain just that bread and wine.
